Hall founded the Pittsburgh-based group in 2012 after being a distant member of the Philadelphia-based Penn LUG. Steel City LUG has about 120 members, including

one in Uniontown and one in Confluence. They host quarterly business meetings at members' homes but often participate in public events, such as the International Children's Festival in Pittsburgh where they helped youths build Lego cars to race on a pinewood derby track.

When the popular and critically acclaimed "The Lego Movie" came out in 2014, Warner Brothers contacted the group to build a display of the movie title for premiere at the Loew's Theater at the Waterfront shopping and dining complex in Homewood.

"We build for libraries, museums and had our displays in a downtown art gallery," Hall said.

Hall himself has competed at and twice won a Lego competition in Squirrel Hill. He said his winning entries included

a replica of Pittsburgh Penguin Sidney Crosby and a replica of the University of Pittsburgh's Cathedral of Learning, which now makes its home at Pitt. The cathedral also made it onto the Lego website for consideration as a kit. While it didn't earn enough votes, the project brought more attention to Hall and Steel City LUG.

For the Fayette County Fair, Steel City LUG is planning to bring a five-feet-long bridge with the word Pittsburgh spelled out on the side. Across the top will be a display of Pittsburgh landmark buildings, such as the David Lawrence Convention Center.

Hall is also thinking of bringing his display of Mister Rogers, the beloved Pittsburgh television personality, which won second place at the Squirrel Hill competition. The display shows Fred Rogers in his television home, sitting down to put on his shoes with the closet door open to reveal his sweater collection.

Like many Lego lovers, Hall played with the building bricks as a child but said, "I went into the dark ages in high school and college when you don't play with them anymore."

Hall, who has a master's degree in organizational leadership from Robert Morris University and is an IT manager for a large, financial company in downtown Pittsburgh, came back to Legos after buying his first house when his mother told him to take his stuff with him.

He began playing with Legos once again and creating displays, posting photographs of them on a blog. They were seen by a teacher who invited him to her school. Eventually, Hall discovered an online, worldwide interest in Legos where people are known as Adults Fond of Legos (AFOL) and official Lego User Groups that are recognized by the Lego company. He joined Penn LUG where he was a member until someone suggested he start his own group.

Asked how many Legos he owns, Hall said, "I would say close to 200,000 pieces and they're all organized."

Hall buys them from people getting rid of their collections or online through <u>www.bricklink.com</u>, where he said people all over the world go to buy and sell Lego parts.

He enjoys sharing his interest in Legos with his two young daughters and, along with other volunteers, will be glad to do the same with the public at the fair.

"It's a hobby for anybody," said Hall. "There's a lot of artistic expression. Everybody's welcome."


