Three Sisters Bridges



The Three Sisters are three similar self-anchored suspension bridges spanning the Allegheny River and connecting the North Shore to downtown.

The bridges have been given formal names to honor important Pittsburgh residents:

Roberto Clemente (Sixth Street Bridge)

Andy Warhol (Seventh Street Bridge)

Rachel Carson (Ninth Street Bridge)





The Cathedral of Learning is a 42-story skyscraper that serves as the centerpiece of the University of Pittsburgh's main campus in Oakland.

Standing at 535 feet, the
Late Gothic Revival
Cathedral is the tallest
educational building in the
Western Hemisphere and
the second-tallest
university building in the
world, after the main
building of Moscow State
University.

Forbes Field



Forbes Field was a baseball park in the Oakland from 1909 to June 28, 1970.

It was the third home of the Pittsburgh Pirates and the first home of the Pittsburgh Steelers.

The stadium also served as the home football field for the University of Pittsburgh "Pitt" Panthers from 1909 to 1924.

Allegheny Observatory



During the 1900s Allegheny Observatory was one of the major astronomical research institutions of the world.

In 1912 the Allegheny Observatory building was rebuilt and dedicated at its current site in Riverview Park, located in Observatory Hill.

Monongahela Incline




The Monongahela Incline was built in 1870 by engineer John J. Endres and has been in nearly continuous use for a century and a half.

It was the first passenger cable railway built in the United States.

Duquesne Incline

The Duquesne Incline was opened to the public May 20, 1877.

It was the first
Pittsburgh
incline designed
and built by
Samuel
Diescher, an
engineer.



He had become the country's foremost builder of inclines, and was also to design and build most of the inclines that followed.

Heinz Field



Heinz Field is a football stadium located in the North Shore.

It primarily serves as the home of the Pittsburgh Steelers and the Pittsburgh Panthers.

Heinz Field also served as the home field of the Gotham Rogues in the 2012 film *The Dark Knight Rises*.





The Point is a Pennsylvania state park in Downtown Pittsburgh at the confluence of the Allegheny and Monongahela rivers, forming the Ohio River.

The park also includes the outlines and remains of two of the oldest structures in Pittsburgh, Fort Pitt and Fort Duquesne.

PPG Place

PPG Place is a complex downtown, consisting of six buildings within three city blocks. The complex centers on One PPG Place, a 40-story office building.

PPG Place was designed by architects
Philip Johnson and
John Burgee.



Named for its anchor tenant, PPG Industries, who initiated the project for its headquarters, the buildings are all made of a matching glass design consisting of 19,750 pieces of glass.

USS Requin



State-of-the-art and battle ready when she set out just days before the end of World War II, Requin holds the distinction of being the Navy's first Radar Picket submarine.

80 men used their expertise, humor and sheer ingenuity to carve out a rough and adventurous life during USS Requin's (SS 481) lengthy defense and scientific missions, some of which are still classified.

The USS Requin is permanently docked at the Carnegie Science Center.
